Demonstration





Jerry, Christy and our own, Paul Bucca from the East Boise Ambulance District, came to the meeting to give us training on first aid. Christy is an EMT instructor, so she handled the the CPR instruction. Jerry handled how to stop the bleeding, and Paul handled tourniquets and chocking. Jerry said that what was going to be taught at the meeting is not a certified class. The CPR training is going to be hands only for adults. Jerry will teach bleeding control for different types of wounds. Paul will teach tourniquet, and how and when to use the tourniquet. Paul will also update us on the Heimlich maneuver.







Here, Paul is showing us how to properly apply a tourniquet. Once applied, a tourniquet is not usually removed.

Paul had an attachment that he could wear that simulated a chocking person.

By having Paul turn around and have his back to you, you are able to feel for the right area of the abdomen, and then tell what kind of pressure you need to clear a chocking persons airway.

Jerry told us that many of the new techniques for first aid have came from the war zones. He recommended getting a class in CPR and first aid to learn the proper methods of giving aid to an injured person. You never know if it will be your loved one that needs your help to save their life.







Trudy Webb made this 9" diameter plate out of Walnut. Beautiful grain in this plate. Trudy donated the plate to Tom Turco to auction off for the kids camp.





John Sackuvich made this 6 $\frac{3}{4}$ " diameter X 4" high bowl out of Cherry and Walnut. John donated the bowl to Tom Turco to auction off for the kids camp.





This bowl above and the hollow form below, were brought in by Rich Howard.

The bowl is Box Elder with some nice flame running through it. The hollow form is Maple Burl. Rich told us this is his first hollow form.

Rich donated both pieces to Tom Turco for the kids camp.







Gary Moon brought in his style of native American flutes. They are made out of Boxelder, Poplar and Alder. The top left picture shows the two center flutes have been lashed together to make one double flute. There are tone holes on the left flute, and the right flute has no tone holes.



Wes Pilley has now built a Rose Engine for ornamental turning. It is also known as a rocking head lathe. The top row is an aluminum box. The next row is Olive Wood. The third row is a Cow Horn box. He told us that you get the cow horn and soak it in ammonia for about 2 weeks. The horn will be soft. Have a round form ready, and when the horn is soft, slip it on the form and let it dry. Make a top and bottom, and you have a cow horn box.















Here, he has made a box with his ornamental lathe. The finial has three separate spires. They are not connected, except at the bottom.





John Lucking brought in this bowl that is full of character, or as he said, "this bowl is full of worm and/or ant holes." He said the bowl was part of a larger piece of wood that he got in Oregon. He finished the bowl with oil. It is 7" diameter and 2" high.









Connis Wilson told us that his neighbor asked him to make a cremation urn for their son. He made this fabulous urn. He used PVC pipe fittings for a threaded lid.

Connis found the two small pieces of wood on his shop floor, so he turned this beautiful box.

The following boxes were donated to "Beads of Courage" at the AAW Symposium in Portland.





This beads of Courage box is a collaboration with Lyn Tozer and Liz Meyer. Lyn turned the box and Liz did the art work. Liz used the nursery rhyme, "Humpy Dumpty" on the box. She changed the wording to make it better for the kids. Pictured, top right and bottom left; "Along came the doctor and nurse's to make Humpy Dumpty better than new."









Trudy made this box out of Maple and a Koa lid. Trudy worked all day on the box. She got a perfect fit, so she went in for the evening. The next morning, disaster! The box warped, and the lid didn't fit. There was no way to remount and return the lid or box, because there was not enough wood left. She did find one location where the lid fit great. An owl was wood burned into the lid and body that made alignment marks. Trudy made two finials for the box. The first one (left picture) has a Beads of Courage logo bead inlayed in the top. She didn't like it because it was not centered. So she made a new one, (right picture),





Jon Gurnett made this box out of Maple and Ebony, The Beads of Courage logo bead is inlayed in the inside of the lid.





Susan McCoy brought in this box for Beads of Courage. No lights to be found anywhere. The top left picture shows a ring with inlayed stones. I think they are to reflect ambient light.
